<p>Sporting Achievements and Performances 2017-18</p> <p>This year we have had outstanding achievements in Sport and PE. Llangrove CE Academy was awarded for the first time, a GOLD School Games Mark award.</p> <p>Throughout the year, our Key Stage 2 children competed against a number of local schools at local venues such as John Kyrle High School and Ross Rugby Ground. These sports included, Short Tennis, Rounders and Netball.</p> <p>Llangrove CE Academy also took part in the HMFA Federation Sports League. Eight schools in the Federation competed in a variety of sports. Representatives from Years 3,4,5 and 6 participate. The Athletics Track event, held at Hereford Leisure Centre, was the culmination of all the competitive events held throughout the year. All Key Stage 2 children participated and achieved a fantastic 3rd place. Overall, Llangrove CE Academy achieved 4th place in the League and took 1st place out of all the small schools.</p> <p>Key Stage 2 children represented the school in a swimming gala held at Monmouth Boys School Sports Club. With schools from the local area competing, the children achieved great results with a few 2nd, 3rd and 4th places. Our club swimmers competed in separate races and won numerous races.</p> <p>EYFS and Key Stage 1 children attended the HMFA Federation multi-skills event at Hereford Leisure Centre. <p>In an effort to get active and encourage participation, numerous initiatives have been introduced this academic year. Every child is expected to participate and encouraged to do as “much as they can” in ten minutes by walking/jogging/sprinting around the school perimeter.</p> <p>Years 4, 5 and 6 performed an Egyptian Dance at the Courtyard theatre in Hereford. Their dance was based on their topic at school and was part of the Moving Targets dance showcase. A variety of dances were performed to families and friends by a large number of local primary schools.</p>
