

Curricular Theme: Where the Wild Things Are ~ Islands & Volcanoes

Beech Class



The children have been introduced to a non-fiction ~ non-chronological text by Marie Richards. We have identified the features of the text and used these to locate answers to questions. E.g. using the subheading 'Habitat' to find the answer to a question about where monsters live! Please ask your child to share a fact or facts about monsters that they found out. Year 2s work has focused on groups of objects and numbers that are divisible by 2, 5 and 10.

Year 3s have investigated how a number more than 48 can be identified as being divisible by 4 or not.

Beech Class Geographers

We have discovered the names and locations of the ten largest islands in the world. We used our knowledge of the seven continents to support our map skills. Year 2 named the islands on a large map. Year 3s also ordered the islands using the populations of the islands and compared with the size order.

We have been making our own islands. We look forward to showing them in celebration collective on Friday 28th.









Curricular Theme: Who Are We?

In English, we have been developing

Maple Class our researching skills. We used non-fiction texts to deepen our knowledge of information writing. We will be using these skills when we write our own information piece on an endangered animal. Year 4 have been working hard on understanding the relationship between multiplying by 10 and multiples of 10. We have been making numbers ten times bigger and deepening our grasp of place value.

Year 5 have been working hard on finishing their unit on short multiplication. They have grasped how to multiply three digits by a two digit number wonderfully well. We are now moving onto short division and how we use the formal method effectively and efficiently.

Outdoor Learning

Maple Class were busy with outdoor learning on Wednesday! The children were given the task of creating something relating to Llangrove with anything they could find in our outdoor learning classroom. We had some brilliant creations! We had a den that was named 'Mr Cromby's House', a map of the village drawn with charcoal on wood and a barn made from sticks and wool.

We also got to visit our pond area and found the exciting discovery of tadpoles! We used pond dippers to carefully get some out for a closer look with our magnifying glasses!

Curricular Theme: Egypt: Land of the Pharaohs

Oak Class



We have finished reading The Hobbit! It is a fantastic story and was enjoyed by all. We have written a synopsis of the plot and written a review of the story to display alongside our own artwork. Our new text type is 'Instructions'. We are revisiting how subordinate clauses add crucial detail to instructions and how they can be placed at various points within a sentence. In maths, we have looked at how to multiply and divide fractions. We are now learning about fraction, decimal and percentage equivalents. E.g. 0.1 = 1/10 = 10% We will be using our knowledge of percentages to find percentages of amounts – very useful for finding those bargains whilst shopping!
