Acorn Class	Curricular Theme: Around the World 💲	
Tiddler	Surprise'. They included some fantastic language, punctuation and adjectives. We worked hard on our editing skills to make sure our writing made sense.	Year 1 have been exploring teen numbers. We have been recognising them, ordering them, partitioning them and solving missing number sentences. Reception have working hard on recognising numbers by spotting number bond patterns. We have been using rekenreks, counters and number tracks to help our maths.

We very much enjoyed a very wet outdoor learning on Thursday, focusing on our plants we have been exploring in science. We went on a plant hunt to find garden and wild plants, identified trees around our school field and planted some tomato plants. We even had time to jump in muddy puddles! A lovely afternoon!










olcanoes



The children have been reading volcano themed poems – looking at the different forms of poetry as well as the descriptive language. They have written their own Kennings and Acrostic poems, using the 'word banks' we've made during our reading sessions.

The children have enjoyed finding out how **Flat Stanley** became flat. They are now keen to borrow books from our class library and read about his other adventures. **Year 2** have been focusing on finding parts of a "whole" and learning that ½ is equal to 2/4. We have looked at objects in our everyday lives that we can find fractions of.

Year 3 have been learning the terms denominator and numerator. They have sequenced tenths – counting up and down. They have had a go at recognising equivalent fractions, e.g that 5/10 and 16/32 is the same as one half. Additionally, trying to find 2/4 and 3/4 of numbers.

It was so lovely to hear the pupils sharing their books with Beech class parents and guardians at our Open Classroom event. They spoke so confidently and proudly about their achievements, subjects they've enjoyed and facts that they have



learned.

Our class display of watercolour paintings of Mount Fuji ~ inspired by the work of Japanese artist, Hiroshige (who painted 36 views of the snow-topped volcano.

Maple Class

Curricular Theme: The Ancient Greeks



In English, we have started our Ancient Greeks persuasive writing unit. We began by making Top Trump cards for the Greek Gods/Goddesses. To add to our knowledge, we explored common Ancient Greek suffixes and in turn, created our own Ancient Greek words and their definitions. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed this task! We have explored our model, ready to begin innovating and persuading children to join their own Ancient Greek school

In maths, Year 4 have returned to exploring fractions. We are currently adding and subtracting mixed numbers with the same denominators. They are using their maths language to explain how they have come to their answer.

In Year 5, the pupils have been solving mysteries! They have been finding the missing number by using their knowledge of the relationship between a non-unit fraction and the whole number. They are having to divide by the numerator to find the unit-fraction and then having to multiply by the denominator to find the whole number. They have been working hard!

Topic: Ancient Greeks

In Topic, we hosted our own Ancient Greek Trials. We were exploring the difference in crime and punishment from Ancient Greece to modern day. The pupils explored the types of crimes that would have been punished. The children were split into their houses and held trials for their "criminals". We had a range of crimes committed: planting trees with beehives in their neighbour's gardens, their dog biting a friend and allegedly marrying for money! Art: Black Figure Pottery

Here is our Ancient Greek Pottery display. The children took their time taking inspiration from historical vases to draw common Greek patterns and people in motion on their own versions of black figure pottery. Here is the display!

Curricular Theme: Land of The Pharaohs



We have finished writing our 'Cursed' story – documenting an archaeologist's exploration of King Tutankhamun's tomb and releasing the curse that lay within it.




Planning is well underway for our end of year production. This year Year 6 will be performing 'Peter Pan...ish'.


Mental health and well-being, along with using the internet safely and positively is a key message that we promote in Llangrove CE Academy throughout the year.
