Class Story English & SPaG Maths

Curricular Theme: 'It's a kind of magic!'

Acorn Class

Year 1 have continued to explore our story of 'Room on the Broom'. We have explored verbs and how we can put them into the past tense. The children worked hard to spot the past tense verbs in the story and have created their own past tense verb magpie list to help them when writing their own story. We have just started to innovate the story and have come up with some fantastic ideas ready for writing!

Reception have continued with learning the sounds s, a, t, p, i and n and have been using their sound knowledge to find the initial sounds of words. We found out that the dragon from our story had stolen our initial sounds off some of our words this week and reception were quick to put them back on so the word was complete!

Year 1 have been looking at the composition of numbers 6-10. We have been using the structure of 5 and a bit to help us partition our numbers. We have been using a tens frame, part whole model and a bar model to represent our numbers 6-10.

Reception have been exploring numbers 1,2,3 and 4. We have been using our subitising skills to recognise the numbers, spotting the numbers within dots and sorting a range of different representations into the right number. We enjoyed playing bingo using our subsitising skills!





On Wednesday to link in with our topic of 'It's a kind of magic', the children explored a bit of magic with Mrs. Dean!

They learnt about primary &

secondary colours and discovered that when mixed together they make brown.

Curricular Theme: Changes: Stone Age to Iron Age

Beech Class



We have been reading the 'Cave Baby' by Julia Donalson ~ looking at the rhyming words & repeated phrases or sentences used by the author, which have helped us recite the story.

In our non-fiction text lessons we have completed 'River Unicorn' factual information maps.

We have been focusing on vocabulary and symbols for comparing 1, 2 and 3 digit numbers. The children have recorded a number in digits, words, pictures and place value to demonstrate their understanding of number. They have also counted and organised multiples of 10, inclduing solving word problems.

In our daily times tables the children are focusing on their knowledge and speed of recall for x10.

Inspired by photographs of Stone Age art, the children have created their own pastel and charcoal artwork for the class 'cave' display.









Curricular Theme: Rivers and Mountains

Maple Class



We have been learning our story 'Thog's Journey'. We have created a story map and designed our own book covers.

We have been using our knowledge of place value to round 3 digit and 4 digit numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000. We have also been ordering numbers with up to 6 digits.



In science, Maple Class have been investigating up thrust in water. We carried out an experiment to test how saline water can alter the uplift acting on an object.

In geography, we have started learning about the course of rivers. We used atlases to identify different famous rivers around the UK.



Curricular Theme: At the Front

Oak Class



We have rewritten our model text from the secondary character's perspective. Our punctuation and grammar focus has been speech punctuation and we have found areas within the story where speech would be a useful strategy in conveying character emotions.

We have looked at how we can represent numbers up to 1,000,000 – ensuring we are concrete in our understanding of the value of each digit within a number. We have practised adding and subtracting powers of 10 from any given number and ordering numbers on a number line.

It was so lovely to celebrate giving thanks for the 'harvest superheroes' with parents, carers and family in church last Friday.

Acorn Class delighted us with their 'Harvest Super Heroes' song; Beech Class gave thanks to farmers. Maple Class read their Harvest poem & Oak Class gave their thanks to delivery drivers.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WHATSAPP

(16+)

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With more than two billion active users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls, WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service. Its end-to-end encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients not even WhatsApp itself can read them. This privacy issue has been in the spotlight recently, as the UKS Online Caley Bill proposes to end such encryption on private messaging. WhatsApp is unwilling to do so and has reportedly considered withdrawing its service in the UKS hould this legislation go a head.

EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious 'emergency'. Plus a scam where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to log in to your account, then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repeat the code back to them giving them access

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

To start a chat, sameone only needs the mobile number of the Whots App user that they want to message. If your child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via Whots App. It's also possible that your child might be added to a group chat (by one of their friends, for example) containing other people that they don't know other people that they don't know

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly — whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than five times on the app now display a "Forwarded mony times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just received is far from an original _ and might not be entirely factual, either.

'VIEW ONCE' CONTENT

mestages that can only be viewed once has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate images or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshot this 'disappearing' content - but a recently added WhatsApp feature now blocks this, citing increased privacy.

CHAT LOCK

Another new option allows users to store certain messages or chats in a separate locked chats' folder, saved behind a passcode, fingerprint or face ID authenticator The risk here is that this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversions and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of (such as age-inappropriate material).

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's live location feature lets users share their current whereabouts, which can be helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely on the way home, for example. However, anyone in your child's contacts list or in a mutual group chat can also track their location – potentially letting strangers identify a child's home address or journeys that they make regularly.

Advice for Parents & Carers

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage your child to treat unexpected messages with caution:
get them to consider, for example, whether the message sounds like
something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they
know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary
of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verification
adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

THINKING BEFORE SHARING

Help your child to understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy – and all too common – for content to then be shared more widely (even publicly on social media). Encourage your child to consider how an ill-judged message might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change your child's WhatsApp settings (go to 'Privacy', then 'Groups') to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval; you can give permission to 'My Contacts' or 'My Contacts Except ...'. Additionally, if your child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need – and then turn it off.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Some parents like to check in with their child about how they're using WhatsApp, explaining that it will help to keep them safe. If you spot a 'tocked Chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of chats that are in there, who they're with and why your child wants to keep them hidden. Also, if your child has sent any 'view once' content, you could discuss their reasons for using this feature.




