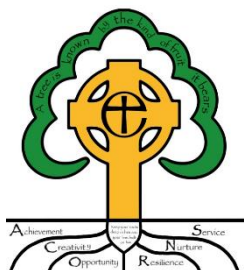



	Class Story	English	Maths
Acorn Class		<p>Year 1 have been planning their instructions, using their toolkit of all the key features in our model text. We have started writing, remembering our bullet points for our 'you will need list'.</p> <p>Reception have continued to work on writing cvc words, listening out for the first, middle and final sound.</p> <p>In computing we have been exploring the different parts of a computer and how we can use them. We had great fun using a mouse to draw a picture and a keyboard to type our names.</p>	<p>Year 1 have been exploring addition and subtraction as inverse operations. We have been using first, then, now model to support our number sentences and understanding.</p> <p>Reception have been exploring the composition of numbers to 5 looking at parts and wholes. We have been building number towers to find what a part of the number is.</p>
Beech Class		<p>This week in English, the children have continued their work on persuasive texts about London. We have been learning about some of the city's most famous landmarks, exploring what they are, why they are important, and collecting interesting facts to use in our writing. Year 2 have been focusing on identifying landmarks, understanding their meanings, and writing simple, factual sentences. They have enjoyed building their own fact files and using "You can..." sentences to persuade a reader to visit. Year 3 have taken this further by exploring persuasive</p>	<p>This week in maths, the children have been exploring halves and fractions on a number line. Year 2 have been learning to find half of numbers by locating the midpoint between two values on a number line. Year 3 have found one quarter and three quarters, building confidence using number lines to show equal parts. The children have also enjoyed playing partner games to practise finding numbers that are 1 more and 1 less, and then moving on to 10 more, 10 less, 100 more and 100 less. These hands-on activities have helped them spot</p>

		<p>language, including strong adjectives and reasons to visit London. They have also been practising using fronted adverbials (e.g. <i>In the heart of the city, All around London,</i>), to add detail and impact to their sentences.</p>	<p>patterns and make connections, such as how the tens digit changes when adding or subtracting 10.</p>
		<p>In RE this term, we are exploring celebrations on life's journey and thinking about how different religions mark important stages as people grow. Last week we learned about birth celebrations, and this week we looked at entering adulthood. We focused on this stage in Judaism through the Bar Mitzvah (for boys) and Bat Mitzvah (for girls). We discussed what these ceremonies mean, why they are important to Jewish families, and how they mark the moment when a young person takes on new responsibilities. The children enjoyed comparing these celebrations to their own experiences of growing up, thinking about how they show responsibility and how families recognise important moments in their lives.</p>	
<p>Maple Class</p>		<p>During English, we have been working on using our senses to help inform our creative writing. We turned our list poems into paragraphs that used weather to change the tone.</p> <p>We have also learnt our model text by creating a text map. The video of Maple Class recounting their information text is on Seesaw!</p>	<p>Year 5 have started a new unit of short multiplication and division, having finished negative numbers. We are beginning by partitioning two digit numbers, calculating the partial products and then adding them together to get the final product.</p> <p>Year 4 have continued with their 3,6 and 9 times tables. They have learnt how to explain whether a 4 or 5 digit number is divisible by 3 or 6 with a digit sum magic trick! They are now moving onto spotting the patterns with adjacent multiples of 9.</p>
		<p>In our RE lessons, we have been looking at Jewish festivals and celebrations. We have had our own Shabbat feast with grape juice and challah bread. We also had our own Rosh Hashanah – we did the Tashlich tradition and had apples dipped in honey to symbolise the sweetness of the New Year. <p>Oak Class</p>		<p>During our English sessions, we have discussed possible locations for our new Warning Tale story to take place. The pupils voted for a Scrapyard! In our Grammar session we looked at the difference between a sentence written in the Active Voice and a Passive Voice</p>	<p>In Maths, we have looked at decimal numbers and playing games to enhance our understanding of different values. E.g. $0.08 = 8 \text{ hundredths} = 80 \text{ thousandths}$. We also ordered decimal numbers with differing digit amounts. E.g. $3.5 > 3.486$</p>
		<p>In our Topic session, we were introduced to the term 'Propaganda' and discussed its importance in Britain during the First World War. We then analysed the techniques used by filmmakers in one of the many propaganda videos played in cinemas across the UK during the conflict.</p>	

Remembrance Day...

On Remembrance Day, our children and staff showed great respect as they gathered on the playground, facing the village cenotaph. Together, they observed a two-minute silence to honour those who have served and sacrificed. It was a moving moment that reflected the children's thoughtful nature and understanding of the importance of remembrance.

Oak Class surrounded the cenotaph with their reflective poems, sharing their thoughts and observations about the importance of remembrance with the community. They also displayed poppies in the hall windows.
